EAST OF CRICKET IS A FLOODLI'

History will be made this summer as the NatWest Series introduces yet more innovation to English cricket

Building on the success of last year's World Cup, the tournament brings the first international matches in this country to be played under floodlights.

Day-night matches have proved a great success in the domestic game. They generate big crowds and a buzzing atmosphere - as anyone watching at Bristol, Old Trafford and Edgbaston will find out.

There should also be no shortage of excitement at the other matches, all of which start at the more traditional time of 10.45am.

Coloured clothing, black sight screens and a white ball are established as part of the international cricket scene - and there is every chance for the less familiar match venues being used for the NatWest

Series to follow suit.

Bristol, Canterbury and Chester-le-Street have only hosted a handful of international matches between them. They now get the chance to add to their experience, and all the evidence suggests they will do so successfully with big crowds making the most of the fine facilities to enjoy some top class cricket.

Certainly the three sides contesting this inaugural NatWest Series have much to offer.

In beating India and South Africa on the way to the Super Six stage of the World Cup, Zimbabwe went further than their opponents this time round and showed they can live with the best.

Heath Streak is capable of taking wickets against anyone, while Neil Johnson was fourth in the World Cup batting totals - his 367 runs including a century in 118 balls against eventual winners Australia.

The West Indies will look to Brian Lara for the bulk of their runs but will also be hoping for further progress from young Ramnaresh Sarwan.

The hosts' preparations have been hit by injury to captain Nasser Hussain but England have every confidence in a squad that blends youth and experience. Graham Thorpe is back to bolster the batting. The as yet uncapped Paul Franks will offer tough competition for the front line bowlers.

And the rewards for success are significant. Each man of the match will win £1,500 while the reward for the man of the series is £3,000. The winners of each match will collect £10,000 and the winners of the final will earn £20,000.

They will also receive the NatWest Series Trophy and set the standards for Australia and Pakistan, who will face England next year, and India and Sri Lanka, who will compete in 2002.

SQUAD

ANDY CADDICK

Rorn: 91/11/68 Right arm fast medium Right hand batsman **Debut: 1993**

Established himself as England's first choice new-ball bowler after success at international level in 1999. Brings with him a fearsome record and is firmly established as one of the most potent wicket-taking forces at county level. Can produce pinpoint accuracy preferring line rather than length to pin batsmen on the back-foot.

ROBERT CROFT

Born: 25/5/70 Right arm orthodox bowler Right hand batsman **Debut: 1996**

Despite still struggling to fully establish himself at Test level he has flourished more at one-day level, featuring as a member of the World Cup squad of 1999. Despite being best used for his off-spin abilities he can also feature with the bat to bolster England's tail end.

MARK EALHAM

Born: 27/8/69 Right arm fast medium Right hand batsman **Debut:** 1996

Ever reliable, he is a true all-rounder and has become an integral part of the one-day international scene. A capable and adaptable batsman he combines power with guile and as a bowler he offers arguably one of the most economical records in current English game.



DARREN GOUGH

Born: 18/9/70 Right arm fast medium Right hand batsman **Debut:** 1994

One of England's most popular players, Gough has re-discovered his form after injury blighted his early career to establish himself as one of the most effective strike bowlers around. A central figure of the World Cup campaign and one of the few to sparkle in England's colours. At his best the iovial Yorkshireman is arguably one of the finest on the world stage.

PAUL FRANKS

Born: 3/2/79 Right arm fast medium Left hand batsman **Debut:** uncapped

Another young hopeful. Impressive county form and his performances in the England A tour of 1999 have brought the Nottinghamshire seam bowler firmly into the spotlight of the selectors. A key member of England's U19 World Cup winning side of two years ago, he will be hoping to bolster his growing reputation with an inspired debut performance.



ANDREW FLINTOFF

Born: 6/12/77 Right arm medium Right hand batsman **Debut:** 1998

England's young starlet has made a significant impression since his international debut in 1998 and has proved both powerful and versatile with bat and ball. After impressing on the England A tour of 1998/99, he forced his way into the World Cup squad but had little chance to shine. However, after a promising start to the county season he will be looking to transmit his form to international level with a solid all-round performance.

ALAN MULLALLY

Born: 12/7/69 Left arm fast medium Right hand batsman **Debut:** 1996

Mullally has been in and out of the England side and has never fully established himself at international level. But he still possesses a powerful wicket-taking threat with his combination of angle and pace. Variable with the bat he has worked hard in recent years to strengthen his performances at the crease.

VIKRAM SOLANKI

Born: 1/4/76 Right hand batsman Right arm orthodox bowler **Debut: 2000**

After a worthy debut earlier this year, the young Worcestershire batsman promises much as one of England's growing young talents. At only 20 he has already established himself as a talented performer at the crease with over 500 first class runs in the 2,000 season.

GRAEME HICK

Born: 23/5/66 Right hand batsman Right arm orthodox bowler **Debut:** 1991

A steadfast campaigner, his talents shine best in the one-day arena where he has now amassed over 3,500 runs. A crucial member of the England outfield he is also a versatile batsman with a wide range of strokes who can, on his day, turn a match. On occasion, though, he has struggled to transmit his form to international level and produce what he has so often promised.

CRAIG WHITE

Born: 16/12/69 Right hand batsman Right arm fast medium **Debut: 1994**

After several years in the international wilderness, his surprise recall in January has seen him re-establish himself on the international scene. His lively bowling style and agility in the field make him perfectly suited to one-day cricket where he has also proved influential with the bat, turning in several century performances as opener for Yorkshire.

NICK KNIGHT

Born: 28/11/69 Left hand batsman Right arm medium **Debut:** 1995

Initially seen by the selectors predominantly as a one-day performer, he continues to excel at the top of the English order. Despite a dip in form which saw him omitted from the World Cup squad, he has forced his way back into contention with an impressively high average this season and reliable performances in the field for Warwickshire.



ALEC STEWART

Born: 8/4/63 Right hand batsman Wicketkeeper **Debut: 1989**

The former England captain continues to prove dependable as part of the opening pairing and has rediscovered his form at county level with a series of inspired batting displays. Has struggled in the past to combine performances behind the wickets with those at the crease and led England with a poor showing at the World Cup which cost him his job.

GRAHAM THORPE

Born: 1/8/69 Left hand batsman Right arm medium **Debut: 1993**

Back in the international fold after opting out of England's winter tour of South Africa. He has struggled on occasions to convert his obvious talent into century scores. His lefthanded style provides an alternative approach to the English middle order which he combines with an agile ability in the field.

JIMMY ADAMS

Born: 9/1/68 Left hand batsman Wicketkeeper/Left arm orthodox Debut: 1999

Once rated the top batsman in the world he was appointed captain in March in succession to Brian Lara. A true all-rounder he combines a powerful batting style with the ability to bowl a deceptive left arm orthodox and can stand in behind the stumps if needed. He combines his utility role with an infectious competitive streak which saw him figure highly in the

West Indies' World Cup campaign.

SHERWIN CAMPBELL

Born: 1/11/70 Right hand batsman Right arm orthodox bowler Debut: 1994

A crucial member of the squad as the in-form opening batsman of the side. He copes well with any type of attack and in full flow is capable of destroying any side with his aggressive stroke play and unfaltering concentration at the crease. Also renowned as an agile fielder.

SHIVNARINE CHANDERPAUL

Born: 18/8/74 Left hand batsman Left arm leg break bowler Debut: 1994

The stabilising influence of the middle order, he has showed a maturity beyond his years to command a regular international place over the past few years. A consistent run scorer, he builds innings on a strong defence and invariably spends lengthy spells at the crease. His leg break bowling has enjoyed some success at domestic level but remains largely untried internationally.

COREY COLLYMORE

Born: 21/12/77 Right arm fast medium Right hand batsman Debut: 1999

Lively fast bowler whose inclusion in the squad sees him return to the international scene after a career-threatening back injury that put him out of action for eight months. Nursed back into the fold, he impressed in the A team tour of England last year where his economical display brought him back to the attention of the selectors.

MERVYN DILLON

Born: 5/6/74 Right arm fast medium Right hand batsman **Debut:** 1997

Arguably one of the best up and coming fast bowlers in the world, his ability to provide both pace and swing has seen him rise to prominence in international cricket. He can be inconsistent, with too much variety in his deliveries on occasion, but has worked hard to improve his game after the embarrassment of being sent home from South Africa after the Test series of 1999.

CHRIS GAYLE

Born: 21/9/79 Left hand batsman Left arm orthodox bowler Debut: 1999

A lively left-handed batsman with a reputation for attacking bowlers, Gayle has impressed immensely at domestic level as opening batsman for Jamaica where he boasts an impressive average. Relatively untested at international level he has the potential to be a rising star amongst the West Indian ranks and can combine powerful stroke-play with a wicked off-spin if required.

ADRIAN GRIFFITH

Born: 19/11/71 Left hand batsman Right arm medium Debut: 1996

A product of the A squad, Griffith has moved up through the ranks of West Indies cricket and hails from the same breeding ground as the legendary Desmond Haynes. Tall and ungainly, he prefers a defensive approach with the emphasis on protection rather than attack in what can best be described as a solid batting style.

WAVELL HINDS

Born: 7/9/76 Left hand batsman Right arm medium **Debut:** 1999

Comfortable either in the middle order or as an opener, Hinds is a hard-hitting batsman who seems to offer improvement with every display. Averaging well over 50 in one-day internationals, he is another emerging star from the Windies and possesses arguably the best fielding arm in the squad.

RIDLEY JACOBS

Born: 26/11/67 Left hand batsman Wicketkeeper Debut: 1996

Extremely agile behind the stumps, Jacobs has risen to prominence as an integral part of the squad since his debut in 1996. A patient batsman who possesses great technical ability if somewhat lacking in flair. He has reserved some of his finest performances for the limited overs matches but will be looking to re-discover his form on this tour after batting poorly in his last one-day outing against Pakistan in April.

REON KING

Born: 6/10/75 Right arm fast medium Right arm bowler **Debut:** 1999

His main asset is pace which combined with a good technique has seen him develop as a potent wicket-taking threat. He prefers the one-day scene and with best figures of 4-25 could pose more than a few problems for England's top order.

BRIAN LARA

Born: 2/5/69 Left hand batsman Left arm bowler Debut: 1990

Resigned as captain after losing to New Zealand earlier this year but remains the focal point of West Indian cricket. On form and at full fitness he still has the ability to destroy any form of attack and amass runs quickly. Hugely adaptable, he possesses a variety of strokes and vast technical ability.

NIXON McLEAN

Born: 28/7/73 Left hand batsman Right arm fast Debut: 1996

Back from injury to re-claim a place in the squad, he is viewed by many as a potential star of the future bowling attack. His greatest asset is arguably his pace and he will be looking to use his chance to display pacey rightarm style to its full potential.

MAHENDRA NAGAMOOTO

Born: 9/10/75 Left hand batsman Leg break googly As yet relatively untried but extremely promising leg break bowler, who could prove to be a West Indies secret weapon of the future.

RICARDO POWELL

Born: 16/12/78 Right hand batsman Right arm slow orthodox

A talented young batsman who is primarily an attacking middle order batsman he is also excellent in the field.

FRANKLYN ROSE

Born: 1972 Right hand batsman Right arm fast Debut: 1997

Called up to the squad for the first time in 1997 after a two-year lay-off from cricket, he is a threatening member of the bowling attack. He struggles at times to remain economical but has a proven track record at international level as the first West Indian to take a six-wicket haul on his Test debut

RAMNAWESH SARAWAN

Born: 23/6/80 Right hand batsman Left arm bowler Debut: 9000

Became the youngest first-class cricketer in West Indian history when at the age of 15 he appeared for Guyana against Barbados in the Red Stripe Cup. Progressed through the ranks to make his Test debut earlier this year against Pakistan where he impressed with an unbeaten 84 first innings display.

COURTNEY WALSH

Born: 30/10/62 Right arm fast Right hand batsman Debut: 1984

One of the finest pace bowlers in international cricket, he combines lightning quick deliveries with variety to prove more than a match for any batsman in the world. Able to swing the ball both ways, he is capable of producing pinpoint accuracy and destroying an order single-handedly. For all his prowess with the ball his weakness lies in batting and he carries with him the dubious honour of most Test ducks in the international game.

ANDY FLOWER

Born: 28/4/68 Left hand batsman Wicketkeeper Debut: 1992

Inspirational captain and superb batsman who doubles up as a more than capable wicket-keeper. Made a century on his debut for his country against Sri Lanka in the 1992 World Cup and has gone on to score more than 4,000 runs in limited overs internationals. Has also claimed 100 catches behind the stumps.

HEATH STREAK

Born: 16/9/74 Right hand batsman Right arm fast medium **Debut:** 1993

Superb bowler in both Test and oneday arenas, who has racked up more than 100 wickets in the limited overs game since making his debut against South Africa. Pacy and aggressive bowler, who is also a useful batsman down the order and can always make vital contributions. His one-day average of 20 is excellent for a lower order player.

GRANT FLOWER

Born: 20/12/70 Right hand batsman Slow left arm orthodox Debut: 1992

Brother of captain Andy, a solid opening batsman who is approaching the 4,000-run mark in the one-day game. Has hit 25 fifties and three centuries in his limited overs career. A useful slow left-arm bowler in one-day cricket, Flower is also an outstanding all-round fielder who can save vital runs for his side.

ALISTAIR CAMPBELL

Born: 23/9/72 Left hand batsman Right arm off break Debut: 1992

Former Zimbabwe captain who was thrust into the international arena at the age of just 19 in the 1992 World Cup. The youngest Zimbabwean to score a first-class century, the aggressive strokemaker has scored more than 3,000 one-day runs including three centuries and 17 half-centuries. Also a more than capable fielder

GARY BRENT

Born: 13/1/76 Right hand batsman Right arm medium fast **Debut:** 1996

Emerging bowler who has been a consistent, if unspectacular, performer for his country since making his one-day debut against Pakistan. Has picked up 23 wickets in 18 appearances for Zimbabwe and, despite not being the most gifted performer with the bat, can add late runs. Made his Test debut against Sri Lanka last year.

STUART CARLISLE

Born: 10/5/72 Right hand batsman Right arm medium **Debut:** 1995

Dogged and determined one-day middle order batsman who has one fifty and one century to his name. Carlisle has been in and out of the side since suffering the misfortune of being run out for a duck on his debut against Pakistan. Has been deployed as an experimental opening batsman but has now returned to the middle of the order.

MURRAY GOODWIN

Born: 11/12/72 Right hand batsman Right arm medium **Debut:** 1998

Very much an in-form batsman who has become one of the mainstays of the Zimbabwean batting line-up. Goodwin's family moved to Australia when he was 13 and he played for the U19 side and Western Australia before moving back to Zimbabwe to further his international chances. Already well on the way to 2,000 one-day runs after just two years but this will be his final flourish for Zimbabwe as he is returning to Western Australia.

NEIL JOHNSON

Born: 24/1/70 Left hand batsman Right arm fast medium Debut: 1998

Extremely talented all-rounder, who has made a real impact since opting to play for Zimbabwe after playing in South Africa. Has already scored four hundreds and eight fifties and always provides entertainment while at the crease thanks to his attacking style. A competent bowler who is capable of picking up vital wickets.

MPUMELELO MBANGWA

Born: 26/6/76 Right hand batsman Right arm fast medium **Debut:** 1996

'Pommie' is one of Zimbabwe's most promising stars although he has yet to really hit the heights in the one-day game. Relies on line and length because of his lack of genuine pace and has benefited from Dennis Lillee's coaching. Still needs to develop as a batsman.

MLULEKI NKALA

Born: 1/4/81 Right hand batsman Right arm fast medium **Debut:** 1998

Burst onto the international scene when he made his one-day debut against India at the age of just 17 and managed to capture the wicket of Sachin Tendulkar. Captained the Zimbabwe U15 team and has risen through the ranks but has yet to establish himself as a regular but still has plenty of time on his side at the age of 19.

HENRY OLONGA

Born: 3/7/76 Right hand batsman Right arm fast Debut: 1995

An inconsistent performer, Olonga made history when he became the first black player to represent his country in 1995. Has also benefited after coaching from Dennis Lillee but has found it hard to perform well on a regular basis. Hit the headlines when he took 6-19 against England last winter.

BRYAN STRANG

Born: 9/6/72 Right hand batsman Left arm medium fast Debut: 1995

Medium-paced seamer who prides himself on bowling with great economy. Made an immediate impact on the one-day international scene by taking 4-36 against Pakistan on his debut and also has a six-wicket hau to his name. Despite his initial success, he has failed to hold down a regular place in the side.

PAUL STRANG

Born: 28/7/70 Right hand batsman Leg break **Debut:** 1994

A quality all-rounder who can bowl wicket-taking deliveries and score runs down the order. The brother of Bryan, he has played county cricket in England with Kent and Nottinghamshire in recent years and now has more than 80 wickets in the one-day game. Also a superb fielder, who patrols the area around backward point.

DIRK VILJOEN

Born: 11/3/77 Left hand batsman Slow left arm orthodox Debut: 1997

Exciting young all-rounder who was part of Zimbabwe's World Cup squad that did so well in England last year. Was Zimbabwe's young cricketer of the year in 1996/7 and made his debut at the age of 19 against Sri Lanka. A technically-sound batsman and more than useful bowler who can provide great variation which is so often required in limited overs cricket.

GUY WHITTALL

Born: 5/9/72 Right hand batsman Right arm medium **Debut:** 1993

Solid all-rounder but as a middle order batsman he has never quite fulfilled the potential he has shown with the bat. Has scored nine one-day half-centuries without going on to record a ton. He has also picked up 75 wickets and is fast approaching 100 one-day international appearances.

CRAIG WISHART

Born: 9/1/74 Right hand batsman Right arm medium Debut: 1996

Still establishing himself as a one-day batsman despite having played more than 40 games for his country. Has a century and fifty to his name but averages a disappointing 18 in limited overs cricket. Rarely called upon to bowl but is capable of doing so with gentle medium pacers.

WR Hammond holds the record for the highest individual county innings, with 302no in 1934 against Glamorgan. While the highest individual innings in a limited-overs match belongs to IT Botham, 138no against Worcestershire in 1990. The best bowling performance came from EG Dennett against

Essex in 1903.
With players including Grace, Jessop, Crapp, Emmett, Graveney, Allen, Zaheer, Proctor, Russell and Walsh, few grounds can claim to have nurtured more talent. The present ground was first used by Gloucestershire CCC in 1899 against Lancashire, and was laid to WG Grace's specification.

Crowds at Bristol are usually around 5.000 6,000, yet the best attendance was 15,000, reached in both 1930 and 1948, and for a limited-overs match 7,500 spectators saw the NatWest Trophy semi-final against Notts in 1987.

PROFILE:

Surrey County Cricket Club was formally created on October 18 1845. The first match was played against Kent in 1846, and the first County Championship match was staged in 1873 against Sussex.

The Oval has staged matches in all major competitions for Surrey CCC as well as international matches, and as such is steeped in history. Some of the remarkable events include: L Hutton's 364 against Australia in 1938; D Bradman ended his Test career at the ground, with an average of 99.94, having been bowled for a duck; Surrey's highest ever innings B Abel scored 357 no.

Players to watch

Andy Flower

Profile: All-action Zimbabwe skipper Andy Flower is a wicket-keeper batsman of undoubted class. A tactically-aware leader, the left-hander is very adaptable and can switch from defence to attack with equal effect. But expectations of Flower have always been high. The Mashonaland star struck a century on his official one-day debut against Sri Lanka in the 1992 World Cup. And he was also instrumental in helping Zimbabwe win their first Test match under his captaincy scoring a brilliant 156 in the victory over Pakistan during the 1994/95 season.

Neil Johnson

Profile: The perfect oneday player - a quality batsman who also bowls at a lively pace. After opting for Zimbabwean nationality in 1998, the dashing lefthander quickly established himself as a toporder player capable of demolishing any bowling attack in the world. Johnson, who learned most of his cricket in South Africa with Eastern Province and Natal, averages over 35 with the bat in international one-day cricket, while he has also picked up a 30 wickets. And he is right back in form ahead of the NatWest Series clash against the West Indies, scoring a brilliant century from just 138 balls in the warm-up victory against Somerset.

6th July at Bristol

Following on from their recent success in the Caribbean against Pakistan and First Test win over England, the West Indies once again look a well-oiled winning machine ahead of the NatWest One-Day Series opener against Zimbabwe.

With veteran pace star Courtney Walsh still producing top-class performances at international level - and the return to form of star batsman Brian Lara - captain Jimmy Adams will enter the series in buoyant mood.

Hampshire were the latest side to be beaten by the confident Windies in a limited overs clash at Southampton - thanks to an inspired performance from the superbly accurate Walsh.

At the tender age of 37, Walsh claimed three wickets in his 10-over spell, while Ambrose, who will not be playing in the NatWest Series, returned figures of 9.1-6-11-2 to help dismiss Robin Smith's side for 189.

The Windies' refreshed batting line-up, which includes new stars Wavell Hinds and Christopher Gayle, have shown how much they have improved from the side that toured South Africa two years ago, as they battled to the victory target of 190.

But no matter how confident Adams and his team-mates currently feel - you write off Zimbabwe at your peril.

Despite enduring a poor run of form in the last six months - which included a 3-0 one-day home series defeat against England at the start of the year - Andy Flower's side pride themselves on being an efficient, wellorganised limited overs team.

A brilliant fielding outfit, Zimbabwe produced the shock of last year's World Cup when they defeated South Africa to reach the Super Six stage of the tournament.

And following convincing warm-up victories against Somerset and Durham, Flower and his team-mates look to be finding their feet at just the right time.

NATWEST SERIES – HOW IT WORKS

O All matches will consists of one innings per side and each innings will be limited to 50 overs. A minimum of 25 overs per team shall constitute a match.

O Matches shall be of one day's scheduled duration with the exception of the final, for which a reserve day has been allocated in case of weather interruption.

Oln matches without a reserve day there is provision for for up to 60 minutes of extra official playing time in day matches and and up to 30 minutes in floodlit matches to make up for time lost.

O Play is scheduled to start at 10.45am with an interval of 45 minutes at 2.15pm and close of play at 6.30pm.

O At floodlit matches play is scheduled to start at 2.30pm with an interval of 45 min-

utes at 6pm and close of play at 10.15pm. \odot Two drinks intervals, each one hour and 10 minutes apart, are permitted for each

O Where play is delayed or interrupted the umpires will reduce the length of the interval between innings. If up to 60 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 30 minutes. If between 60 and 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 20

minutes. If more than 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 10 minutes. \odot The innings of the team batting second shall not commence before the scheduled time unless the team batting first has completed its innings at least 30 minutes prior to the scheduled interval. In such circumstances a 10-minute break will occur, the team batting second will commence its innings and the interval will occur as scheduled.

O At the instant of delivery there may be not more than five fieldsmen on the leg side. O For the first 15 overs only two fieldsmen are permitted to be outside the field restriction marking at the instant of delivery. This restriction will be lifted earlier in circumstances where the number of overs is reduced.

O No bowler shall bowl more than 10 overs in an innings. In a delayed or interrupted match where the overs are reduced no bowler may bowl more than one-fifth of the total overs allowed.

O A no ball will be called for short-pitched bowling. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.

O Umpires have been instructed to apply a very strict and consistent interpretation in calling wides. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.

O Teams will wear coloured clothing and use white balls manufactured by Duke.

O Teams will play each other three times in the group stage and score two points for a win and one point for a tie or no result.

O If the scores in a match are level the result shall be a tie and no account shall be taken of the number of wickets that have fallen.

O The top two teams in the group will contest the final. In the event of teams finishing

on equal points the right to play in the final will be decided according to: The most wins in the group matches. The team that won the most matches between the tied sides. The team with the higher run rate. The team that has taken the higher number of wickets per balls. In the event that teams are still level they will draw lots.

THE DUCKWORTH/LEWIS SYSTEM

The system is based on what percentage of its resources (overs and wickets) a team have left. With 50 overs left and 10 wickets remaining, a team have 100 per cent of its resources left. The table shows the percentage of resources at other stages in the innings.

The procedure for working out targets is as follows:

1) For each innings: Use the table to calculate the resource percentage lost by the interruption and therefore calculate the resource percentage still available.

2) If team B have less resources available than team A, calculate the ratio of the resources available to both teams. Team B's revised target is obtained by scaling down team A's score by this ratio.

3) If team B have more resources available than team A, calculate the amount by which team B's resources exceeds team A's.

Work this out as a percentage of 225 (the average 50-over score in ECB matches and one-day internationals). This gives the extra runs to add to team A's score to give team B's target
